
QUEER PEDAGOGY

Gender Grammar

Problem	Correction	Reason
"transgendered" (adjective)	transgender	Only adjectives that are derived from nouns and/or verbs (unlike transgender) end in "ed."
"intersexed"	intersex	Only adjectives that are de- rived from nouns and/or verbs (unlike intersex) end in "ed."
"transgendered" (verb)	transition	Only verbs can have "ed" added onto the end of the word to become a participle. Transgender is an adjective, not a verb. One does not "transgender," they transition.
"a transgender," "transgenders"	a transgender person, transgender people	Transgender is not a noun. "Jake is a transgender" is not only grammatically incorrect, but can be offensive.
"sex change," "sex reassignment surgery," "gender reassignment surgery"	gender affirming surgery, genital reconstruction surgery, genital reassignment surgery	Surgery does not change one's sex or gender, only genitalia.

GENDER DENTITY - EXPRESSION

STATE Commission on Human Rights

In New York City, it's illegal to discriminate on the basis of gender identity and gender expression in the workplace, in public spaces, and in housing. The NYC Commission on Human Rights is committed to ensuring that transgender and gender non-conforming New Yorkers are treated with dignity and respect and without threat of discrimination or harassment.

This means individuals have the right to:

- Work and live free from discrimination and harassment due to their gender identity/expression.
- Use the bathroom or locker room most consistent with their gender identity and/or expression without being required to show "proof" of gender.
- Be addressed with their preferred pronouns and name without being required to show "proof" of gender.
- Follow dress codes and grooming standards consistent with their gender identity/expression.

GENDER IDENTITY

One's internal, deeply-held sense of one's gender as male, female, or something else entirely. A transgender person is someone whose gender identity does not match the sex they were assigned at birth.

EXPRESSION

External representations of gender as expressed through, for example, one's name, pronouns, clothing, haircut, behavior, voice, or body characteristics. Society identifies these as masculine and feminine, although what is considered masculine and feminine changes over time and varies by culture. Many transgender people align their gender expression with their gender identity, rather than the sex they were assigned at birth.

Courtesy 101:

- If you don't know what pronouns to use, ask. Be polite and respectful; if you use the wrong pronoun, apologize and move on.
- Respect the terminology a transgender person uses to describe their identity.
- Don't make assumptions about a transgender person's sexual orientation.

A GLOSSARY

The Complex Linguistics of the Campus Queer Movement

Some things about sex haven't changed, and never will. But for those of us who went to college decades ago — or even just a few years ago — some of the newest sexual terminology can be unfamiliar. Below, a cheat sheet.

Agender: a person who identifies as neither male nor female

Asexual: a person who doesn't experience sexual desire, but who may experience romantic longing

Aromantic: a person who doesn't experience romantic longing, but does experience sexual desire

Cisgender: not transgender; the state in which the gender you identify with matches the one you were assigned at birth

Demisexual: a person with limited sexual desire, usually felt only in the context of deep emotional connection

Gender: a 20th-century constraint

Genderqueer: a person with an identity outside the traditional gender binaries

Graysexual: a more broad term for a person with limited sexual desire

Intersectionality: the belief that gender, race, class, and sexual orientation cannot be interrogated independently from one another

Neutrois: agender

Panromantic: a person who is romantically interested in anyone of any gender or orientation; this does not necessarily connote accompanying sexual interest

Pansexual: a person who is sexually interested in anyone of any gender or orientation
